Adrianna featured in April.

Why did you decide to play the violin?

In 2013, I went to see Wallace & Gromit's Musical Marvels featuring the Aurora Orchestra at the Hammersmith Apollo. I was drawn to the violin since then.

Has your music taken you to some cool places? If so, where?

Well the coolest thing that's happened to me was being on TV. Last November, I played Bach's Sarabande as part of the Remembrance Ceremonies at the Imperial War Museum and ended up being interviewed on ITV news! It was really cool to see myself on TV.

What music do you like playing the most?

I don't think I have a favourite. Any sort of music suits the violin and that's why I love it so much. But if I had to choose, it would be classical music.

If you could perform alongside someone famous who would it be? Or what musician do you look up to?

I know his instrument is the cello, but I'm really inspired by Sheku Kanneh-Mason. And although I wouldn't be able to perform with him because he's no longer alive, Yehudi Menuhin was an awesome musician and person.

Has the Scholarship enabled you to have new opportunities?

I've been really fortunate to have the Scholarship and a great teacher. I don't think I would be preparing for my ABRSM Grade 7 now without either. Jose has always encouraged me to perform and my first performance was at the Herne Hill Music festival a few years ago. It was nerve-wracking but I really enjoyed it. I'm in the Lambeth Youth Orchestra and we perform at venues like the Southbank throughout the year. I've even been able to sing Eleanor Rigby accompanied by the LYO.

What advice would you give Scholars who have just started their scholarship?

I would say you have to embrace every opportunity you get because the scholarship is life-changing and you mustn't waste it. And the most important thing is to practise!

Before starting her London Music Fund Scholarship Elicia played in a small string group at her school during break times. Her instrumental tutor at the time was very keen for her to have one-to-one lessons as she could see that Elicia had potential and was incredibly committed to her violin studies. Elicia was nominated for a London Music Fund Scholarship due to her eagerness to learn and hardworking nature. Her family have been through some difficult circumstances over the past few years so having the Scholarship also takes the financial pressure off.

As a Scholar, so far Elicia is thriving and she embraces every opportunity that comes her way. In a normal week Elicia takes part in several activities including: Concordia strings group, a creative world music group, a musicianship class, school orchestra, school choir and a theory class. This level of commitment has thoroughly impressed Elicia's teachers, as well as us!

We are very proud to have Elicia as one of our Scholars and think that her commitment, hard work and passion is an inspiration to other young musicians in London.

Elicia told us: "Being a Scholar makes me feel happy and proud. Playing my instrument makes me feel confident and less shy about things like going on stage in front of people. I am enjoying playing my violin because it's fun and it is a gentle instrument and I really like it."

Elicia's parent told us: "I think Elicia's Scholarship is going brilliantly. Her confidence has really built up this last year and playing is really coming along well.

I think this Scholarship has definitely made her more willing to try things and go for it even if she's scared. We are truly grateful to the London Music Fund for the opportunity for our daughter to be able to grow to her full potential."

London Music Fund: Making a Difference

Recently ABRSM published this lovely interview with Maureen Gulvin who is the mother of two of our Scholars, Molly and Patrick. They asked her what the London Music Fund Scholarships mean to her children.

Can you tells us something about your children's musical backgrounds?

Molly is 11 and Patrick is 10 years old. Molly is working towards Grade 5 violin, Grade 4 piano and Grade 3 percussion. Patrick is working towards Grade 3 violin, Grade 2 piano and Grade 2 trumpet. Both children started playing the violin when they were six, followed by the piano. Percussion for Molly started when she was 10 and Patrick has only started trumpet in the last year.

How long have they been London Music Fund Scholars and what does that involve?

Molly is in her fourth and final year as a London Music Fund Scholar and Patrick is in his first year. They are lucky enough to be able to take part in workshops with talented professional musicians, developing their skills and broadening their understanding of music.

What have the musical benefits been for Molly and Patrick?

Being a Scholar has allowed both children to receive funding towards lessons — violin for Molly and trumpet for Patrick. Molly has taken part in a project with the London Symphony Orchestra, which introduced the children to improvisation skills and was lucky enough to play in the Royal Festival Hall on another workshop. This has helped her create some pieces of music at home. For Patrick, his Scholarship is relatively new but he's looking forward to taking part in any opportunities offered.

Has being a Scholar helped them in other ways, aside from their musical development?

Both children use music as a way of dealing with difficulties they faced when their daddy died from leukaemia in 2014. They often play pieces together. The London Music Fund and our wonderful friends at the local Music Service have supported both children by encouraging them to use music as a positive way of dealing with their grief.

Can you sum up what they enjoy most about playing their instruments and being involved with music?

Molly tells me that just been able to sit and play any instrument makes her happy and she has made some friends through music who are like minded. Patrick enjoys performing, especially trumpet as he is playing his daddy's trumpet and it makes him remember him proudly.

As a parent, how important is it to you that Molly and Patrick make progress musically?

It is very important to me that they progress. They both have an amazing talent and I like the fact that as well as using their talent they are being introduced to different types of music.

Do you have any tips for other parents of talented young musicians?

Regular practice is a must – I provide a practice schedule. All the dropping off and picking up is worth it!
